

Please note: In a proper world and correct world The following Morris (surname) family thread should be Sulley (surname) family thread. Reason being that Nathan Sulley and Elizabeth Morris were unmarried when they had Thomas Sulley/Morris in 1754.

THEFTS FROM BOATS PROPELLERS CUT OFF

EX-MARINER IMPRISONED

"Accused went about these thefts in a systematic manner, and the loss of propellers caused great concern among those who had boats drawn up on the shore," said Sub-Inspector Calwell, when Frederick John Cox, aged 67 (Mr. Ackins) pleaded guilty in the Police Court yesterday to five charges of theft of propellers from boats between Nelson Street and Herne Bay.

Accused sawed through the propeller shafting on the boats, said Mr. Calwell, and sold the propellers as scrap metal.

Counsel said accused, who was formerly a master mariner, had been drinking at the time, and was stupid with drink when he conceived the idea of stealing the propellers. Although they were worth up to £10 each, accused had not received more than 15s

for any propeller.

The magistrate, Mr. F. H. Levien, sentenced accused to two months' imprisonment on one charge, and admitted him to probation for 12 months on the second. An order was made for restitution of £16 10s to the owners of the boats, but the magistrate said he would make no order for restitution to the firms which had bought the propellers from accused.

INQUEST ON MRS. CASH.

HUSBAND TO ANSWER MURDER CHARGE.

(By Telegraph .- Own Correspondent)

HELENSVILLE, this day.

The inquest on Charlotte Sarah Cash was resumed this morning before Mr. W. R. Fosbrooke, coroner. Detective Marsack appeared for the police. He explained that he intended to cut the evidence to the shortest limits possible. At the proceedings which would follow, the evidence would be gone into fully. It would be needlessly distressing to have a repetition by going through the case twice.

Mr. John Quinn, with Mr. John Beale, appeared for Albert Alfred Cash, who was looking fearfully ill and frequently sobbed violently.

Edith May Torbet, deceased's half-sister, deposed as to the family gathering at Cash's boardinghouse, opposite the hot springs at Parakai, on Christmas Day. Uverybody apparently was on good terms. Deceased went to her bedroom after coming from the baths to change her clothes. Cash, who lived outside, went to his tent, and returning entered his wife's bedroom. Soon after deceased screamed out witness's name.

George Morris and Jonathan Morris, receased's brothers-in law, burst open the door, and found deceased kneeling alongside the bed with her throat cut right across. Cash was lying across the bed with a wound in his throat also. Brothers Morris secured him.

Jonathan Morris, a slaughterman at Helensville, deposed that Cash seemed in his usual spirits during the afternoon. The bedroom door was locked when screams brought himself and his brother to the room. Witness kicked it open. Cash was just in the act of cutting his own throat a second time. Witness rushed at him and took the razor away. Deceased died shortly afterwards.



THE N.Z. SHIPPING COMPANY'S RANGITIKI.

The 1883 passage of the <u>Rangitiki</u> to Auckland was an eventful one. Mr. W. Bines, now residing in Auckland, who was one of the ship's companies on this occasion, has supplied me with interesting details taken from his log. "The <u>Rangitiki</u>, Captain Millman," writes Mr. Bines, "left Plymouth on January 30, after taking on board immigrants. On February 3rd, we sighted what we took to be a raft with live human beings on it, all awash. The lifeboat was lowered, and we rescued two men who had been on a deck house (not a raft) for two days and nights. Eight men scrambled on this house when they left the wreck of the Kenmore Castle, bound from Liverpool to Singapore, but six were washed off. Dr. Leger Erson (who was a passenger in our ship, and afterwards settled in Auckland) soon pulled the men round. "On the 8th February, we sighted a dismantled barquentine. At the time, a heavy gale was raging, and we were running under fore and main topsails. At 2 p.m. we came up to the wreck, the Maria Agatha, Captain Owens, from South Wales.

"Under considerable difficulties the lifeboat was lowered, and the master, mate, and five men were rescued. It was very risky work owing to the heavy seas, and we did not get back to the ship until just at dark. Picking up men from a ship in a heavy seaway under such conditions is a far different job from a warship, filled with life rockets and breeches buoy, doing similar work. We had to get close enough to the wreck's lee quarter to allow one man at a time to jump in and then back away, as the lifeboat at one time would be almost level with the ship's rail, and three seconds later twenty feet below.

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"On the 2nd of March, we were again requisitioned. A ship signaled for a doctor, and Dr. Erson again went to the rescue. He found a young fellow who had been suffering with a broken arm for 28 days. The arm was amputated, and the man greatly relieved. The ship was the James Grimsby from Bak to San Francisco. After this, all went well, and we had a fair run to the coast, sighting the North Cape on May 13, and anchoring in the harbor on the 17th. "Mr. Basley, who was third officer on this passage is now Port Missioner at Auckland. Captain Owens of the Maria Agatha remained in New Zealand and commanded the brigantine Pendle Hill, <u>Ada C. Owen</u>, the barque Casa Blanca, and the brigantine Wanganui. He has now retired, and is settled in Auckland. Myself and Mr. W. Walker, two of the men who rescued Captain Owens are also living in Auckland."

THE IMMIGRANT SHIP 'TYBURNIA' TO NEW ZEALAND 1863

AMONGST THE SMALLPOX STRICKEN ABOARD WERE JONATHAN AND HARRIET MORRIS AND THEIR SON JONATHAN...

The 'TYBURNIA' left Gravesend on 31 May 1863 and arrived in Auckland on 4 September 1863 under the command of Captain Coate.

ARRIVAL OF THE SHIP TYBURNIA, CAPT. COATE, FROM ENGLAND, WITH EMIGRANTS. — THE SMALL-POX ON BOARD.

The 'Tyburnia' arrived yesterday from London with immigrants, and we regret to say that a number of cases of smallpox have occurred during the voyage, which will render it necessary for her to be placed in quarantine. The 'Tyburnia' was signalled yesterday morning, and Mr. Pilot Burgess went off and found her anchored off Rangitoto. On nearing the vessel, however, he was informed that some of the passengers had been attacked with smallpox. At the request of Mr. Burgess, the Captain threw overboard a bottle, enclosing a report of the voyage, from which particulars were obtained which will be found in our shipping report. It appears that the 'Tyburnia' left Gravesend on the 2nd of June, and that the small pox broke out ten days after her departure. Thirty-five cases had occurred, nine of which only were serious, and there had been one death, that of a male adult, fifty years of age. It is satisfactory to know that the last case occurred on the 22nd of last month, since which the disease has subsided. Of course, the greatest precautions will be taken to prevent anyone visiting the vessel or leaving it. The 'Tyburnia' is to be brought up as far as Rangitoto passage this morning, and it is proposed to establish a quarantine ground for her near the reef. It is absolutely necessary for the safety of the community that no attempt should be made to board the vessel. Persons having friends on board might be induced to attempt to do so, through ignorance, but we would warn them of the heavy penalties they are liable to for infringement of the quarantine regulations. It is impossible yet to say how long it will be necessary, to keep the 'Tyburnia' in quarantine. It is to be hoped that her detention will not be of long duration, but in the meantime the greatest precaution is necessary. We are informed that the 'Tyburnia' has about 400 passengers on board, principally non-conformist settlers. -While on this subject we may say that there has been a meeting of the medical men in Melbourne, at which re-vaccination was recommended, when the vaccine cicatrix was not perceptible on the arm; but it was not to be done compulsorily. At the same time, we may state that there was a degree of quackery about this recommendation, which called forth

some adverse criticism from the Melbourne press. It occurred about the commencement of the last month; and the case of the 'Tyburnia' brings it to mind. We need hardly call attention to the precautions which have been taken in all the Australian colonies, and at Otago. The maxim of "prevention is better than cure" could not be better applied, than in our case

An adjourned sitting of the Court was held
this morning, and the following business disposed of:—

WILKINS V. TAYLOR.—Claim, £32 17s. Mr. Rees for the plaintiff; Mr. Hesketh for the defendant. This was a cross action. The first action, Taylor v. Wilkins, a claim for trespass, was tried on Monday, before a jury, and a verdict returned for the plaintiff, with damages £12 11s. The present action was brought to recover losses sustained by Wilkins in consequence of certain trespasses and damages to his property caused by the servants or agents of the defendants. The particulars of the claim were set out as follows: -(1.) £5 was claimed on account of five tons of firewood, cut by defendant's man on the plaintiff's land. (2.) £1 for seven weeks' keep of two heifers, turned out of the defendant's paddock, although there was an agreement between the defendant and the plaintiff that they were to be kept there until near calving. (3) £6 for loss of butter that would have been derived from these heifers as dairy cows : the heifers had run netters as dairy cows: the heners have run away into the bush. (4.) £15 for the loss of a bullock "dogged" by the defendant's man into a swamp, where it died. (5.) £1 on account of damage done to plaintiff's fence; services of a bull. (6.) £1 for kauri timber, at 14s per 100 feet. There was also a claim of £1 7s for firewood, which was omitted. The parties are owners of adjoining lands at Waikuku (Kaipara). The plaining lands at Waikuku (Kaipara). The plaintiff resides on the land, but the defendant resides at Mount Albert. The principal questions raised were as to how far a master was responsible for the acts of his servant or care-taker, who acted as agent in his absence. The defendant admitted the item of £4 7s, but in respect to the other items pleaded not indebted; that the acts alleged as trespass by his servant were done "not in the course of his ordinary employment as an agent, without the defendant's consent, and therefore he (defendant) was not responsible for them. The plaintiff was examined at great length, and deposed to the several items claimed. He had repeatedly told defendant's man not to cut the firewood. The firewood was cut or burnt in Mr. Taylor's house or cottage, and the wood was used for fuel. The two heifers got into the bush and became quite wild, so that they were lost to the dairy after they had calved. Thought £6 a reasonable charge for the loss of butter. The bullock was "dogged" to the swamp by Jonathan Morris, a servant of the defendant. The witness spoke to the same effect in regard to the other items of loss or damage charged. This evidence was fully corroborated by the plaintiff's son,

loss or damage charged. This evidence was fully corroborated by the plaintiff's son, Benjamin Wilkins. Mr. Hesketh, for the defence, called Mr. Taylor, who deposed that he had not given his servant Morris any authority to cut firewood on the plainhiff's land, but the directions given to him were, that the firewood was to be got from the defendant's land. It was not at all necessary that the wood should be obtained from plaintiff's land. He had never previously heard of the claim for firewood taken by Morris. The two heifers were bought by the plaintiff, and were to remain with defendant's cattle until near calving. Defendant's cattle ran in the bush as well as on the grass land. Morris worked by the day, and had his choice to work when he pleased. No authority was even given to Morris to cut down ti-tree on Mr. Wilkins' land. Wilkins was cross-examined by Mr. Rees. By the Bench: I generally left Morris instructions what to do, but if he saw anything else necessary he would do it. Jonathan Morris, who had been employed by Mr. Taylor at his farm at Waikuku, gave evidence of the sale of the two heifers in question. The conditions of the sale were that they should run with the defendant's cattle in the bush. At the request of the plaintiff witness got the heifers out of the bush to his own cattle in the paddock, where he kept them until the feed was getting short, and he then sent the plaintiff word that they must be taken away, or he would turn them out to the other cattle. The next morning the heifers were taken away. Witness had never chased a bullock belonging to the plaintiff, and did not know of one having been "dogged." He had taken a few bundles of ti-tree scrub from the plaintiff's land, but had not done so after the plaintiff spoke to He had never cut any firehim about it. wood on plaintiff's land. Michael Foster, a farm servant in the employ of Mr. Taylor, said that at one time he drove the defendant's cows from the plaintiff's land. He had never driven the cows to the plaintiff's bulls, and had not known of any of the plaintiff's cattle having been "dogged." Mr. Rees abandoned the cost of the bullock-Mr. Hesketh addressed the jury for the defendant, and Mr. Rees for the plaintiff. His Honor having directed the attention of the jury to the various points of law, and evidence affecting the issue of the case, the jury retired to consider their verdict. On returning, the jury gave a verdict for the plaintiff on items 1, 5, and 6, viz., £5 for five tons of firewood cut by the defendant's servant, £1 for damage done to fence, and 10s for service of bull. The item £4 7s was admitted. Mr. Rees applied for costs, but the Court declined to grant the application.

ADJOURNMENT,—The case Kelly v. Gibbons was adjourned until 11.30 a.m., and the case Bentley v. White until 2 p.m. on

Friday.

NO "UNWRITTEN LAW" for CAPTAIN CASH. Helensville Wife Murderer Sentenced to Death

JURY RECOMMEND PRISONER TO MERCY.

Verdict of Guilty — Considered He had Provocation — Judge Agrees with Verdict and Rider—Insanity Set Up—The Plea Fails—Guard Woods — Subjected to Keen Cross-Examination—More About the Letter—Some Peculiar Questions—The Judge says "This is a Matter of Life or Death!"—How Cash Appeared —The Sentence—Justice Cooper Holds Out Hope.

The gruesome murder of Charlotte Sarah Cash at the hands of her demented and jealous husband, Albert Alfred Cash, at Helensville, on Christmas Day, caused a painful sensation throughout the land. Throughout the civilised world, the Christmas season is generally a time of rejoicing, when relatives meet together and a feeling of good will and fellowship pervades every home, and

A HORRIFYING MURDER

occurs at such a time the sensation

is doubly sad,

The story of the Helensville mur-der, which was fully told at the time in "Truth," was one that cast a depressing gloom over the holidays, and disclosed one of the most deplorable domestic tragedies of recent times. Briefly, the circumstances were as follows:—Captain Cash, who had for many years been one of the best respected and widely known skappers trading in North Auckland waters, contracted the insidious "white plague" some time ago, and retired from his seafaring life. had just built a large boardinghouse close to the Parakoe Hot Springs, a few miles out from Helensville, and he and his wife had invited a number of their friends and relatives to their new home for a house-warming.

The guests had all gathered together for Christmas dinner, and all went well until during the afternoon, when the ailing husband went to his wife's room, and, while there, is alleged to have discovered a letter to his wife from what was described in court as

HER "REPTILE PARAMOUR,"

a man named Woods. Apparently the sea captain had never suspected his wife's infidelity and became mad with rage. On his wife's return he taxed her with immoral relationship with this man Woods, and an alter-cation ensued. The enraged husband then, evidently beside himself with jealousy, slashed his wife's throat with agrazor and, then turned the deadly weapon on himself. The wife's screams reached the guests, who rushed in and prevented Captain Cash from destroying his own life, but his young wife's life was beyond recall. She died soon after. On January 10, Cash was brought before the Magistrate's Court at Helensville and charged with the wilful murder of his wife. (The evidence was fully reported in "Truth" at the time.) He was committed for trial to the Supreme Court at Auckland. This trial began on Friday forenoon, before Mr Justice Cooper, and lasted until 11 o'clock on the following Mon-day night. Mr J. A. Tole, K.C., prosecuted and Mr McVeagh appeared for Throughout the prothe defence. ceedings the court was crowded, and the greatest interest was manifested in the case. The prisoner Cash, when led into the dock on the arms of two stalwart warders, sobbed bitterly and immediately fell back into a seat. Since his last appearance at Helensville, the

UNHAPPY MAN HAD AGED GREATLY

His hair had assumed a greyer tinge, his face was deeply lined, and his features were haggard, indicating what awful mental agony he had suffered during his weeks of suspense. His forehead was crossed by furrows that told of mental pain, and his cheeks were sunken and scarred with those heavy lines that are unmistakable signs of physical weakness. Cash appeared as a man completely broken in health and spirits and only had a very slender hold on life. Continually throughout the proceedings he would burst into fits of sobbing when his wife's name was mentioned, and the only time he seemed to take serious notice of what was going on about him was when Guard Woods, his dead wife's alleged paramour, was in the witness box. During that time Cash's eyes were rivetted on the witness, and glances that spoke of a deadly hate were cast in the direction of the man he believed was the cause of his awful and gruesome deed committed on Christmas Day.
In opening the case for the Crown,

In opening the case for the Crown, Prosecutor Tole reviewed the circumstances of the gruesome Christmas tragedy as they have already appeared in "Truth." He reminded the jury of the solemn duty imposed upon them, and warned them that all preconceived ideas they may have formed should be banished, so that a conscientious verdict might be returned based only on the evidence brought forward at this trial.

The Crown Prosecutor called the following witnesses, Edith May Torbett and Annie Helena Morris, sisters of the murdered woman, who both retold their stories of the tragedy, which were to the effect that on the afternoon of Christmas Day, Cash and his wife were on the best of terms, and while the former was getting tea ready at the house she heard her sister call out "Edie" and scream. Mrs Torbett rushed into Mrs Cash's bedroom. The door was locked on the inside, and the men broke it open. When they entered, Mrs Cash was on the bed

IN A CROUCHING POSITION,

bleeding terribly from a great gash right across her neck, while Cash was lying on the bed with a cut at the side of his neck. A razor (produced) was taken from prisoner by one of the men. Mrs Torbett said to Cash: "What did you do it for?" and he answered, "It's all right, Edic; you know something." Mrs Cash died about half an hour after, without speaking to witness, and the prisoner was taken into the kitchen. Shortly before the tragedy, Cash

had said to witness, when apparently referring to his failing health, "I am sick of this; if I don't get better I'll do for myself and Lottie" (his wife).

Mrs Morris, after the tragedy, sent a message to Guard Woods, at the Albert Hotel, Auckland. Woods went from Auckland to Helensville

the next morning.

Lawyer McVeagh: What prompted you to communicate with Woods? Was it because of the great intimacy between Woods and Mrs Cash?—No, it was first because they were friends.

Do you mean to suggest only friendship between your sister and Woods induced you to send a special message?—Y-3.

To Prosecutor The Witness did not suspect there has any impropriety between Woods and her de-

ceased sister.

His Honor: Was your sister of sweet disposition and preposessing?—

YES, SHE WAS A LOVELY GIRL.

Jonathan H. Morris and William Harris also repeated their previously-told stories. Harris related conversation that they had Cash after the tragedy. The prissaid to witness (Harris). oner "Don't blame me, Harris, you don't know what I had to put up with. would If you knew all, you blame me." Cash further stated. "I had a man in the house that I thought was a friend, and then to get a letter like this is enough to drive a man mad." Cash did not produce any letter. Mrs Cash died in mitnagala arma While in the room

drive a man mad." Cash did not produce any letter. Mrs Cash died in witness's arms. While in the room witness said a man named Cox came in, looked around, and picked up something white in color, which looked like a letter, and put it in his pocket.

John James Cox, a tall, well-built, and muscular young man, a brother of the deceased, gave his evidence in quite an unconvincing manner. He admitted Cash had said to him just after the fatal event. "You look under the bed and you'll find a letter." Witness took Cash out of the room, and then the latter said:

"JACK, YOU'RE TO BLAME.

You know all about it. There is a letter under the bed. You go and get it." Witness made a search, but found no letter, and he had not seen one since. Witness disputed Harris's statement that he (witness) had picked up something off the bedroom floor.

Thos. Alexander Torbett's story was on the same lines as that given by him at Helensville, which was to the effect that Cash threatened to do for himself, and produced a letter, saying, "See who this man (Woods) is writing to all the time." After the tragedy Cash admitted telling his wife, and, when asked why he did it, said, "I was mad, mad, mad!"

William Ryall Frosbrooke, a justice of the peace, residing at Helensville, deposed to visiting Stirling House with Dr. Meinhold on Christmas evening. He saw prisoner, who immediately started talking about the affair. He went on to ex-

plain how he came to find a letter in his wife's bedroom under the mattress. He said: "I opened the letter. It consisted of eight pages. It was written by Woods from the Albert Hotel, Auckland, and started off, 'I am staying in Room 14, where we stayed together—' I could read no further. I became mad." Witness stated that when Cash was relating this story his face was drawn, and set. He was very agitated, not, witness thought, in anger as much as in sorrow. Every time he used his wife's name he wept.

To Lawyer McVeagh: Cash seemed to be all the time in great mental distress. Prisoner explained to witness that he had made over everything he possessed to his wife.

Prosecutor Tole: I think, your Honor, his can scarcely be admitted as evidence.

Proceeding, witness said he saw accused shortly after the proceedings in the lower court at Helensville, and he made a remarkable statement. Cash said: "Last night I had a vision—a most vivid vision. It was a vision of Woods by my bedside pouring out poison into a glass. It was so real I called out, 'Oh, Woods, Woods.'"

His Honor: What was his condi-

tion of mind then?

Witness: He seemed to be all

right. I believe the man was absolutely sincere, and said exactly what he believed to be true. Two constables were present when he made the statement.

Prosecutor Tole: Where was this told to you?

Witness: Outside my office as the prisoner was returning from having his wound dressed at the doctor's.

GUARD WOODS GIVES EVIDENCE.

Alfred William Julius Woods, a stout, ruddy-complexioned, heavy-jawed, thick-necked man, with a heavy red moustache, a narrow fore-head, with eyes set close together, and scanty, red hair, said he was a guard in the N.Z.R. employ. He had

known the Cash family about three years, and intimately for the last twelve months. He had recently been boarding at Stirling House with them. He strenuously denied that there had been any misconduct between deceased and himself.

Woods gave the same evidence as at Helensville, and Lawyer Mc-Veagh's cross-examination was conducted on the same lines.

A CRUCIAL CROSS-EXAMINATION.

Was your interest in Mrs Cash purely platonic friendship?—I don't know exactly what you mean. I don't understand the meaning of the word.

Was it a disinterested affection? —Couldn't you put the question a bit clearer?

Well, why did you visit Mrs Cash?

—It was at Cash's request.

Do you think Cash intended you to visit his wife's house at night alone?—Yes, I do think so.

Why?—Because Cash asked me to go and see her.

At night?—Not particularly. I never went alone.

Will you swear you never went alone at night?—Yes.

Who went with you?—Mr and Mrs Morris.

Did you call on the Morris's and ask them to come with you?—Yes.

How many times were you there at night?—I can't say.

How many times during the day?

—I can't say.

It was purely business took you there, you wish the jury to believe?—Yes it was.

How many times did you meet Mrs Cash at the railway station?—I don't know.

How many times did you take her home ?-I can't say.

Can you then tell us how many times you met her in Auckland?—Five times, I think.

Accidentally ?-Yes.

How many times did you write to Mrs Cash?—Eight, or perhaps ten times.

What were these letters about?— In reference to getting goods for her.

Why did you put yourself to all this trouble for Mrs Cash?—

I WANTED TO HELP HER

---- VIOUNTE TOT TILLS VASIL !-

I WANTED TO HELP HER —both of them.

Why didn't you send the letters to Mr Cash?—He asked me to refer matters to his wife.

A lengthy cross-examination ensued about certain alleged business transactions, and then reference was made to certain railway stores.

Lawyer McVeagh: Did you suggest to Cash he should sleep in a tent?—No, I did not.

Did you supply the tent he slept in ?—Yes, I did.

Where did you get the tent?
Witness (to his Honor): Must 1
answer?

Lawyer McVeagh I ask the name. His Honor: If it is going to incriminate either yourself or anyone else, I cannot compel him to answer

Then you refuse to answer?—Yes. His Honor: Is it not a fact that you had no authority to have that tent? It was a Railway Department tent, I presume?—Yes.

Did you get any drain pipes for Mrs Cash?—Yes.

Where from?

Witness: Must I answer?

His Honor: Yes, I think so.

Witness: They were ordered in my own name.

Counsel: Whom were they consigned to?

Witness: Need I answer that?
His Honor: Yes, you had better.

Witness: Well, I brought them up myself on the train.

Any other things carried free in that way?—Yes.

Railway sleepers and posts?—Yes. Did you not send a letter to Mrs Morris shortly before Christmas?—Yes, I did.

Any enclosures for Mrs Cash?—No. Now, will you swear you did not send an eight-page letter to Mrs Cash just before Christmas?—Yes, I will.

You then know no reason why Cash should refer to an eight-page letter from you to Mrs Cash?—No, I do not.

You heard about a letter ?—Yes. You then understood it contained A REFERENCE TO MISCONDUCT on your part with the deceased woman?—That is so.

How did you hear it ?-I saw it in the paper as I went up to Helens-

But there was no paper on that day. It was Boxing Day. How do you explain that?—No, I don't believe it was now. It must have been friends told me.

When you arrived did you make any inquiries as to how the tragedy occurred ?—No, I did not.

It seems most extraordinary that you actually went to the house where the tragedy took place, and where the tragedy took place, and did not inquire what led up to it. Did you not ask anyone there about it?—No, I did not.

How then did.

How then did you eventually come to know the circumstances?—Someone might have told me.

You found out eventually that your name was dragged into the matter?—Yes.

Did you then make any inquiries? -No.

Why?—Well, I suppose because all those in the house were too upset.

Didn't you know a good deal about the letter, and that is why you didn't ask?—No, it was not.
You eventually saw reference in the papers to a man who had been making improper advances to Mrs Cash?—Yes.

You fitted this newspaper paragraph to yourself, "A man who professed the warmest friendship for Captain Cash had been making improper advances to his wife" ?—Yes; I thought it did.

Passages in a subsequent weekly paper

CAUSED SOMETHING OF A SCANDAL

in Helensville, didn't they ?-Yes. You were anxious about the letter, yet Jonathan Morris was the only person you asked about it ?-That is

Why didn't you ask others ?-Because Jonathan Morris said there was no letter.

Dr. Meinhold, a Helensville practitioner, then told the story of having, on Christmas afternoon, been called to Stirling House, where, on arrival, he found that Mrs Cash was dead. The doctor told of the conversation he had with Cash, evidence of which was previously given by Mr Frosbrooke.

Cross-examined by Mr McVeagh, the witness said he knew Woods, and

had seen him on many occasions at Mrs Cash's house at Helensville.

Would you say he was constantly there?—I believed he lodged there for

some time.

Did you see Woods going there when Cash was at the sanatorium? -I think I did.

Have you seen any tokens from Woods on the passing trains to Mrs Cash?—Yes. I have seen Woods standing outside the guard's van waving his handkerchief and

SOMETIMES THROWING KISSES.

I used to see Mrs Cash standing on the verandah, responding to the waving. I have seen it going on for a pretty long period, during Cash's absence and after his return.

Dr. Meinhold, further questioned,

said that Cash's symptoms were those of phthisical insanity.

Constable Driscoll deposed to conversations he had with accused after he was arrested. It bore out the evidence of Dr. Meinhold and Mr Frosbrooks. Prisoner told witness the letter he found started off, "Dar-ling Lottie," and was signed "Woody," and had two lines of

ling Lottie," and was signed "Woody," and had two lines of crosses at the end. Witness made a search of the bedroom, but could find no trace of the letter.

To Lawyer McVeagh: There would have been ample opportunity for anyone to remove the letter, because between the time of the tragedy and witness's arrival, and also while witness's arrival, and also while witness was attending to Cash, all the members of deceased's family were in the room.

This closed the case for the prosecution.

THE CASE FOR THE DEFENCE.

Lawyer McVeagh made a powerful speech in opening his defence. He thought the evidence he would adduce would prove a succession of incidents calculated to give the prisoner's intellectual powers a violent shock, especially considering his er's intellectual powers a violent shock, especially considering his weak physical state, and that when the act was committed, Cash was incapable of appreciating the value

incapable of appreciating the value and quality of his actions.
William Cox, a timber-worker of Onehunga, and brother of the deceased woman, deposed to attending the funeral at Helensville. While there he stayed with Torbetts. Torbett told him that John Cox got the letter, said to have been written to his sister by Woods.

IT WAS FOUND UNDER THE BED IT WAS FOUND UNDER THE BED after the tragedy. Cox handed it to Mrs Morris, who gave it to her husband. Mr Morris buried the letter till Woods arrived, and it was given to him. Torbett told witness he understood Woods had burned the letter. Mrs Torbett was present during the conversation.

Rhoda May Cox, wife of the last witness, corroborated this evidence. Mrs Torbett admitted to her that if the letter had been discovered and admitted to in the first place there

admitted to in the first place there would have been no trouble, but now they had to stick to the story told in the lower court.

in the lower court.

James Stewart, merchant at Helensville, said he drove Dr. Meinhold out to Stirling House and returned with George Morris. Witness said Morris ascribed the tragedy to a letter found by Cash. Torbett came to witness's shop next morning to use the telephone, and then stated that he had seen the letter.

Several other witnesses were called

Several other witnesses were called to testify to Cash's mental disposi-tion years ago. They all agreed he was a quiet man, but inclined to be moody and depressed at times.

WAS CASH INSANE?

Dr. Peter Lindsay, Auckland's leading medico, in his evidence said he had carefully examined Cash, and was satisfied that there was a condition of mental unsoundness, which was attributable to tubercular disease. At the time of the tragedy, Cash could not know what he was ease. At the time of the tragedy, Cash could not know what he was doing. A suspicion of marital infidelity would be a strong exciting cause and would affect the control of the will. The witness would expect to find insanity in such conditions to expend itself in sudden and violent paroxysms, followed by rational bahavior. tional behavior

In reply to the Crown Prosecutor, witness said he believed Cash was witness said he believed Cash was insane at the time of the tragedy and that he did not know what he was doing. His mind was, according to witness, a blank, and, although it became lucid afterwards, his bodily health prevented him from exercising normal control over himself. That was the case for the defence. Thomas Poynton, chief gaoler at Mount Eden, was called in reput-

tal, and stated that his observation of Cash during his incarceration did not lead him to detect anything beyond bodily illness and mental distress.

Dr. Murray, gaol surgeon, and Dr. Robert Martin Beattie, Superintendent of the Avondale Mental Hospital, both gave it as their opinion that Cash was suffering from pathisis, but was not, and never had been, insane. At the same time, owing to his bodily health, he would not be able to exercise the same amount of control as an ordinary healthy

In an eloquent, trenchant and lucid address of an hour and a half's duration, Lawyer McVeagh claimed that at the time of the commission of the crime the prisoner did not retain that degree of reason which the law required before he could be sent to eternity. He suggested that the facts strongly and unerringly pointed to the conclusion that Cash could not have been of sane mind when the tragedy was committed. He remarked that though the accused was suffering from a disease that would not allow him to live many months longer, his last days

WOULD BE SOMEWHAT SWEETENED

if twelve of his countrymen decided that his terrible act was not that of a deliberative rational man, but the outcome of a frenzy, the result of a state of mind that rendered him incapable of controlling himself, and in which he did not understand the quality or character of his act.

The Crown Prosecutor, in his address to the jury, pointed out that if the letter spoken of existed it furnished the reason for the crime—revenge. On finding what the prisoner thought was an immoral intrigue in which his wife was concerned he decided to put an end to it by taking the life of the unfortunate woman and then his own. That and other circumstances showed that he had gone about the perpetration of the tragedy with full deliberation.

His Honor summed up in a very earnest manner. He was evidently deeply affected, and at times his remarks were hardly audible in the body of the court. He indicated that the question for the jury was either one of guilty or not guilty on the ground of insanity. What the prisoner had to establish was that at the time he committed the act he was incapable of understanding the nature and quality of his act. The prisoner was in

and the evidence indicated that he had lowered in bodily strength during the past few months, and correspondingly decreased in mental power. Further, it was alleged that he disclosed homicidal and suicidal tendencies prior to the tragedy, that was another circumstance in contention of support of the man's mental unsoundness. Just before the tragedy the condition of the prisoner's mind was not one of anger so much as to put himself out of the way, while a few minutes after the event he said he did not know what he was doing. Other circumstances indicated that the prisoner either in a furious passion or of his mind. If the finding of a letter, acting on a man weak in body and his mental condition affected by disease, caused him in a paroxysm of homicidal mania to cut the throat his wife, and in the same paroxysm to attempt to take own life, the jury would be warranted in saying that the prisoner was not legally responsible for his act.

The jury retired at six o'clock. The

case aroused so

WIDESPREAD A SYMPATHY WITH THE PRISONER,

and the judge's summing-up was so favorable, that it was generally anticipated that the jury would return almost immediately with a verdict of not guilty. As time went on, a disagreement seemed certain, but at 9.50 they returned, when to everybody's surprise, the foreman announced that the jury's verdict was guilty. So unexpected was the ver-

guilty. So unexpected was the verdict that the crowded court seemed involuntarily to take a deep drawn breath together. After returning prisoner guilty, the foreman announced that they added a rider strongly recommending the prisoner to mercy on account of the very great provocation he had received.

Cash, who had sat throughout the trial, was assisted to his feet while being asked by the Registrar if he had anything to say why the sentence of death should not be passed. He was unable to make any reply; he only stared vacantly ahead in a dazed state.

His Honor, who was perceptibly moved and was very brief in addressing orisoner, said :-- "Prisoner at the bar: The jury has found you guilty of the crime of murder, with a strong recommendation to mercy. With that recommendation I heartily agree, and will see that it is transmitted to the proper authorities." Donning the black cap, his Honor said: "In the meantime, I must pass the sentence of the court, and that is that you be taken to the place of execution, and there be hanged by the neck until you are dead."

Cash received the sentence unflinchingly, and immediately turned to go below, assisted by two warders. He descended the stairs, but a few moments afterwards his pitiable sobs could be heard, increasing in volume, for some seconds, until they slowly died away.

His two sisters-in-law, Mrs Torbett and Mrs Morris, who were in court, screamed out and fell in a swoon on the floor. They were assisted out, crying hysterically.

The judge thanked the jury, and said he believed their verdict to be one which they conscientiously believed to be correct.
